


What is BIG?



- Universal Basic Income, also often called a universal basic income grant/guarantee (UBIG) is the idea of a guaranteed, unconditional and dignified cash transfer. In some international contexts UBI refers to a basic income grant which is available to any citizen or resident of any age.
- A basic income grant is, first and foremost, a direct investment in human capital by alleviating poverty and hunger, which are unacceptable infringements on people's basic socio-economic rights.
- The UBIG is paid per person, with the target of R796 per person which is the food poverty line.

SRD - R370


- Targeted 18-59 years old.

- Not means tested
- Limit risk of exclusion
